Honorable Village President Board of Trustees Members of the Police and Fire Commission Citizens of Hales Corners

It is my pleasure to present the 2008 Hales Corners Fire Department Annual Report. Once again, your fire department has made tremendous strides in the areas of emergency response, training, disaster preparedness, fire and life safety. As you will see in this document, the men and women of the Hales Corners Fire Department have one goal in mind, which is providing the best levels of customer service possible.

The Hales Corners Fire Department set an emergency response achievement. The department responded to 970 emergencies during the 2008 calendar year. This is an increase of 83 emergency responses, which represents an eight (8%) increase in emergency responses from the previous year. The following pages will categorize these responses.

Fire department committees are established for the benefit and safety of department personnel. The committees include EMS, training, sunshine, safety and health, apparatus and equipment, uniform and clothing, and public relations. Personnel have dedicated and volunteered a significant amount of time for the improvement of the department and safety of personnel.

The fire department has transitioned to serve as the official first responder for the Village. Traditionally the Hales Corners Police Department had been responsible for this task. As new State, requirements were set forth for education and licensing of the first responders; it was fiscally responsible for the fire department to assume these duties. Necessary equipment, training and State plan are complete for the fire department to begin first responder duties in 2008.

I am most proud of all of our firefighters and I thank them all for the excellent job they do. They contribute many hours of training to enable them to respond to fire and medical emergencies and to perform in an extremely professional manner. Spouses and families of our personnel are commended for the tremendous amount of support and compassion they give to our firefighters. I am also very proud of the community in which we serve. The support and appreciation shown to us by our citizens, business owners and visitors is deeply appreciated.

Sincere thanks to the elected officials and the residents for your continued support in 2008. Without your continued support, our delivery of emergency services would be greatly diminished during these tough economic times. We are very proud of the lifesaving and property preservation services that we provide to the community.








Types of Emergency Medical Calls for 2008

Fire Inspection and Code Enforcement

The Fire Inspection Bureau is tasked with visiting each and every public building and apartment complex twice per year to ensure that the employees, employers, and the general public that utilize these areas are safe from fire. The fire inspector surveys each building for fire code compliance and any unsafe acts that could lead to a fire or other circumstances which may need to be referred to the building inspector, health department or other village departments. Each building regardless of its type is inspected to see that:

- ✓ Fire extinguishers are mounted properly, easily accessible, in operating condition, and are inspected annually
- ✓ Exit lights operate properly
- ✓ Exit pathways are clear and unobstructed
- ✓ Exit doors open and are not blocked
- ✓ Surge strips and extension cords are used properly
- ✓ Fire alarms are operating properly
- ✓ Smoke detectors are present and working
- ✓ Sprinkler systems are operating properly and inspected annually
- ✓ Proper storage of gasoline and other flammable liquids

The above is only a small sample of what the fire inspector is looking for to ensure that all applicable state and local fire codes are adhered to. The administrative staff has also been working hard on the proposed fire code, which is anticipated to be adopted early 2009. With the adoption of this code, current standards used industry wide will be enforced as our current code dates back to the 1970's.

Occupancy Management

In 2008 the Fire Prevention Bureau ended an outdated practice of carrying keys for businesses on fire apparatus. The bureau worked with business owners to install a Knox Box key vault on the buildings which holds important keys for the building which the fire department may need in an emergency situation, especially after normal business hours. The fire department is the sole entity that holds the key to lock and unlock the Knox Box. These key vaults are an industry standard and are used in commercial and residential occupancies.

The Fire Prevention Bureau has also been utilizing Firehouse Software for occupancy data management. Every inspection is now being entered into the program along with management and owner contact information.

Fire Prevention and Public Education

History

The history of National Fire Prevention Week has it roots in the Great Chicago Fire, which occurred on October 8, 1871. This tragic conflagration killed some 300 people, left 100,000 homeless and destroyed more than 17,000 structures. The origin of the fire has generated speculation since its occurrence, with the fact and fiction becoming blurred over the years. One popular legend has it that Mrs. O'Leary was milking her cow when the animal kicked over a lamp, setting the O'Leary barn on fire and starting the spectacular blaze. How ever the massive fire began, it swiftly took its toll, burning more than 2000 acres in 27 hours. The city of Chicago quickly rebuilt, however, and within a couple of years residents began celebrating their successful restoration to memorialize the anniversary of the fire with festivities.

Intending to observe the fire's anniversary with a more serious commemoration, the Fire Marshals Association of North America (FMANA), the oldest membership section of the National Fire Protection Association (NFPA), decided that the 40th anniversary of the Great Chicago Fire should be observed not with festivities, but in a way that would keep the public informed about the importance of fire prevention.

When President Calvin Coolidge proclaimed the first National Fire Prevention Week, October 4 - 10 1925, he noted that in the previous year some 15,000 lives were lost to fire in the United States. Calling the loss "startling", President Coolidge's proclamation stated, "This waste results from the conditions which justify a sense of shame and horror; for the greater part of it could and ought to be prevented... It is highly desirable that every effort be made to reform the conditions which have made possible so vast a destruction of the national wealth".

NFPA continues today to make National Fire Prevention Week a priority and counts on the participation and efforts of tens of thousands of fire and safety professionals, emergency volunteers, and other individuals working to reduce the risk of fire and the toll it takes on our society.

Today

Equally important is the role of public education. Each year the Hales Corners Fire Department takes the message of fire prevention and home safety out to the community with various programs designed to educate all age groups.

Traditionally public education is viewed as the fire department visiting schools in October to teach the kids STOP-DROP-ROLL. While this is true, the Hales Corners Fire Department has defined public education programs to focus on various age groups.

October is our busiest time of year. In 2008, members of the fire department brought the message to over 1,700 children and 114 adults from pre-school through fifth grade. Our fire prevention is a tiered approach which builds on the previous year's material presented at each grade level. This ensures that the children get to see something new every year while reinforcing what they've learned in the previous years. Our programs touch on:

- ✓ Seeing a firefighter dressed in his protective gear
- ✓ Seeing a fire truck and handling a fire hose
- ✓ STOP-DROP-ROLL
- ✓ Crawling low in simulated smoke
- ✓ Having an escape plan
- ✓ Having a meeting place
- ✓ Checking smoke detectors
- ✓ Checking the home for fire hazards
- ✓ Survive Alive house for hands on practice

Schools are not our only focus for fire prevention and education. The Hales Corners Fire Department partners with Forest Ridge Apartments, Briar House, and the Village Adult Daycare Center to deliver our fire prevention program, fall prevention program, and emergency medical program.

The fire prevention and education program also coordinates the presentation of our material at several outdoor events such as: Culvers Safety Day, Sentry Safety Day, and Fourth of July events, National Night Out, Aurora Health Fair, Baskin Robins Scoop Night, Whitnall Home Coming Parade, Delivering Santa Clause and Delivering Fire Prevention with Rosati's Pizza in addition to fire station tours and birthday parties. The Public Education events outside of the fire prevention program at the schools reach over 1,500 kids and adults through out the year. We strive to expand our interactive public programs in an effort to educate children and adults and to answer any questions they may have.

As the Mission Statement for the Hales Corners Fire Department reads, 'it is through our members that we provide effective fire prevention and life'.
