On behalf of the men and women of the Hales Corners Fire Department, it is my pleasure to present the 2016 Hales Corners Fire Department Annual Report.


The Hales Corners Fire Chief and the Greendale Fire Chief along with the respective Village Administrators have agreed to a written contract in which The Village of Hales Corners will share the Greendale Fire Department paramedic provider license. The communities of Hales Corners and Greendale desire, for the mutual benefit of their citizens, entered into an Agreement for the creation, planning, and implementation of a joint paramedic program throughout both communities.

In order to increase efficiencies and safety to Hales Corners and Greendale citizens and members of both fire departments; a trial for shared response program began in 2015. Personnel from both departments and resources will respond together automatically for certain emergency scenes when additional personnel power will provide efficiencies and a safer environment or emergency scene. There are several emergency situations and scenes where we could perform more efficiently and safely. These include but are not limited to fire alarms, fire investigations, and automobile accidents. Each department has created a response matrix. The trial shared response was extremely successful and will continue in the future years as routine responses.

In the latter part of 2016, I have been requested by the Village Board to develop a cost neutral plan for the addition of one full-time person in 2017. This plan would add one fulltime personnel ensuring an officer is on-duty for the various shifts. Funds would be moved from temporary salary along with cost reduction. To achieve cost reduction the number of part-time personnel is being reduced. The reduction of personnel reduces the number of EMT- Advanced refreshers, physicals, turn-out gear, on and off duty training, utilizing DPW personnel, and officer weekend stipend. The Fire Chief has begun to work on a proposal and will submit to the village board. With this proposal moving forward December 31, 2016 the village Department of Public Works employees stopped responding to the fire department.

The Hales Corners Fire Department, through its highly trained and dedicated employees, strives to deliver the highest quality fire protection and emergency medical services in the most cost effective manner through quality fire prevention, suppression, and emergency medical services delivery, with the utmost regard for the safety of its citizens, visitors, and employees. We are very grateful for the continued support from our community, village administration, other village departments, and elected officials; without your support, meeting our mission would not be possible.

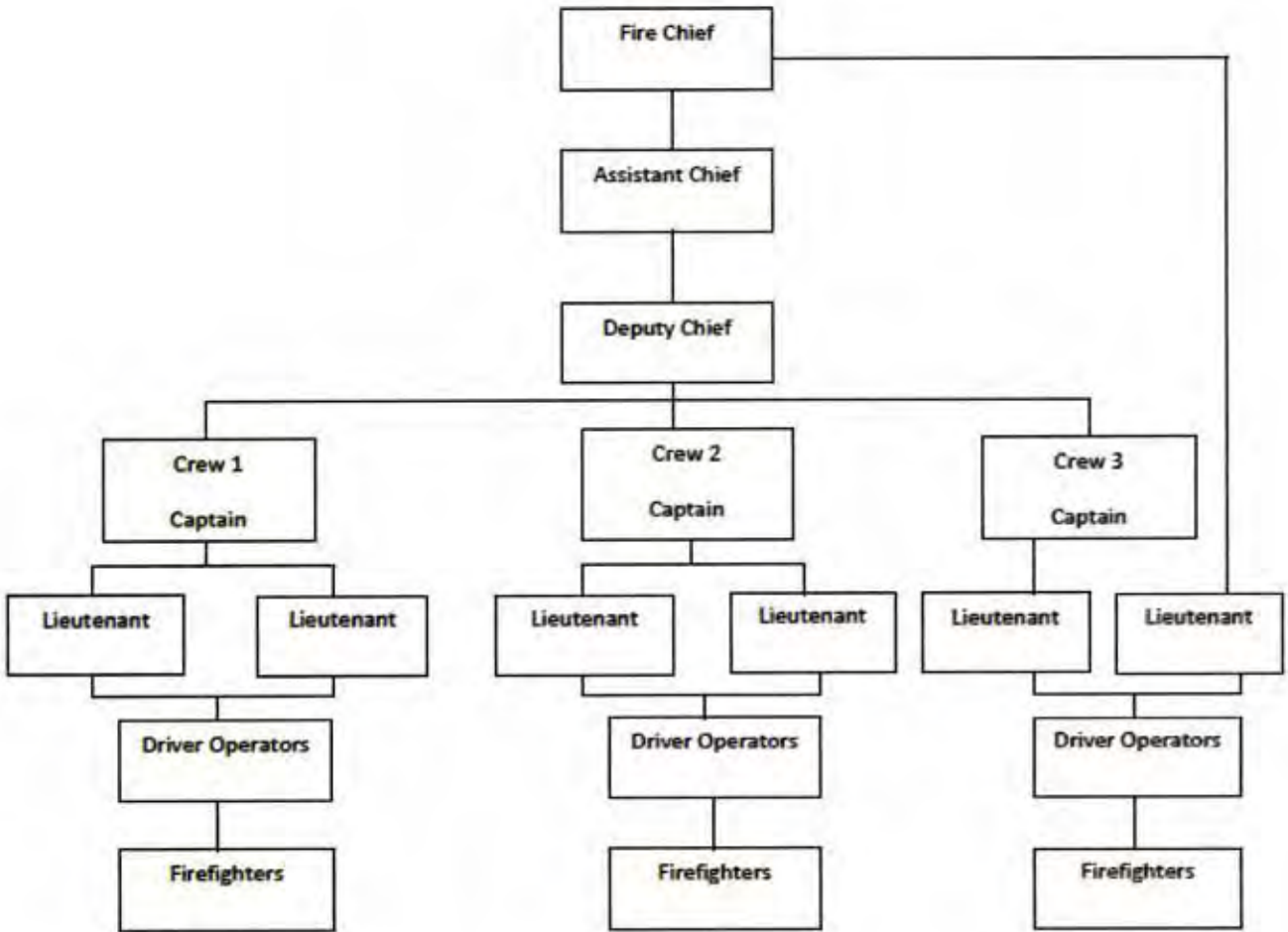

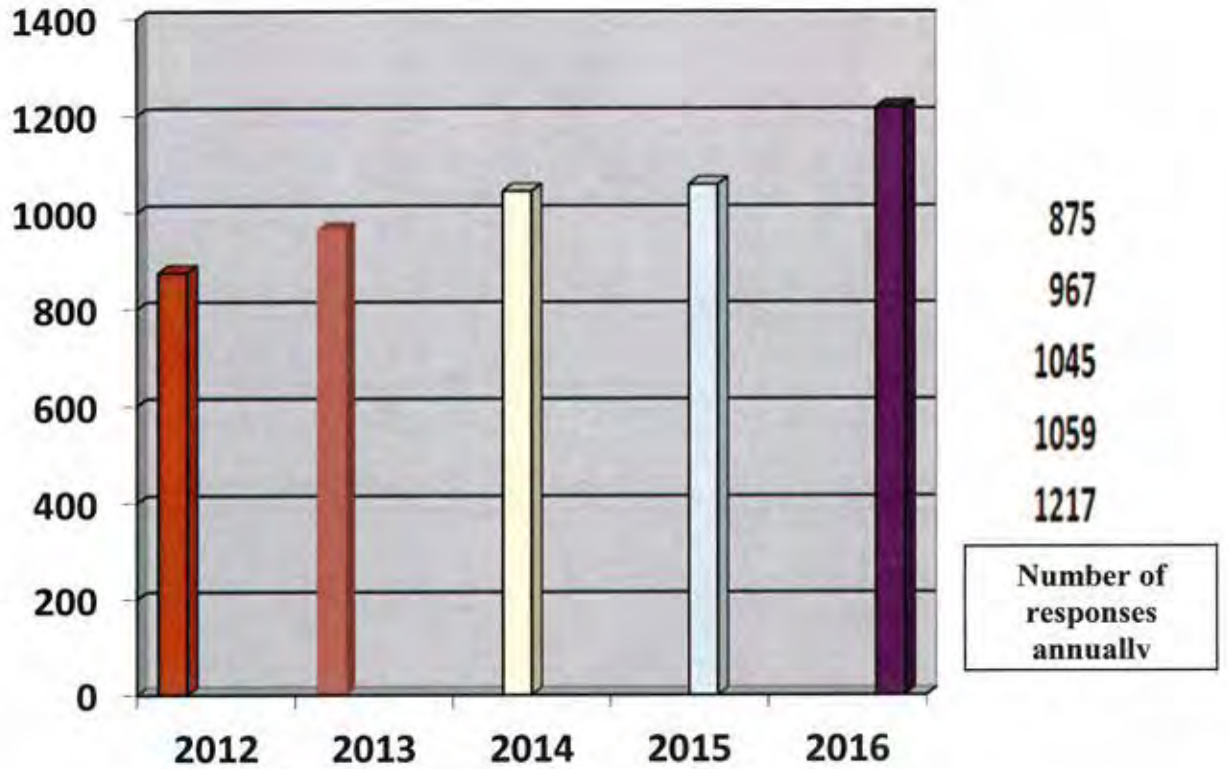

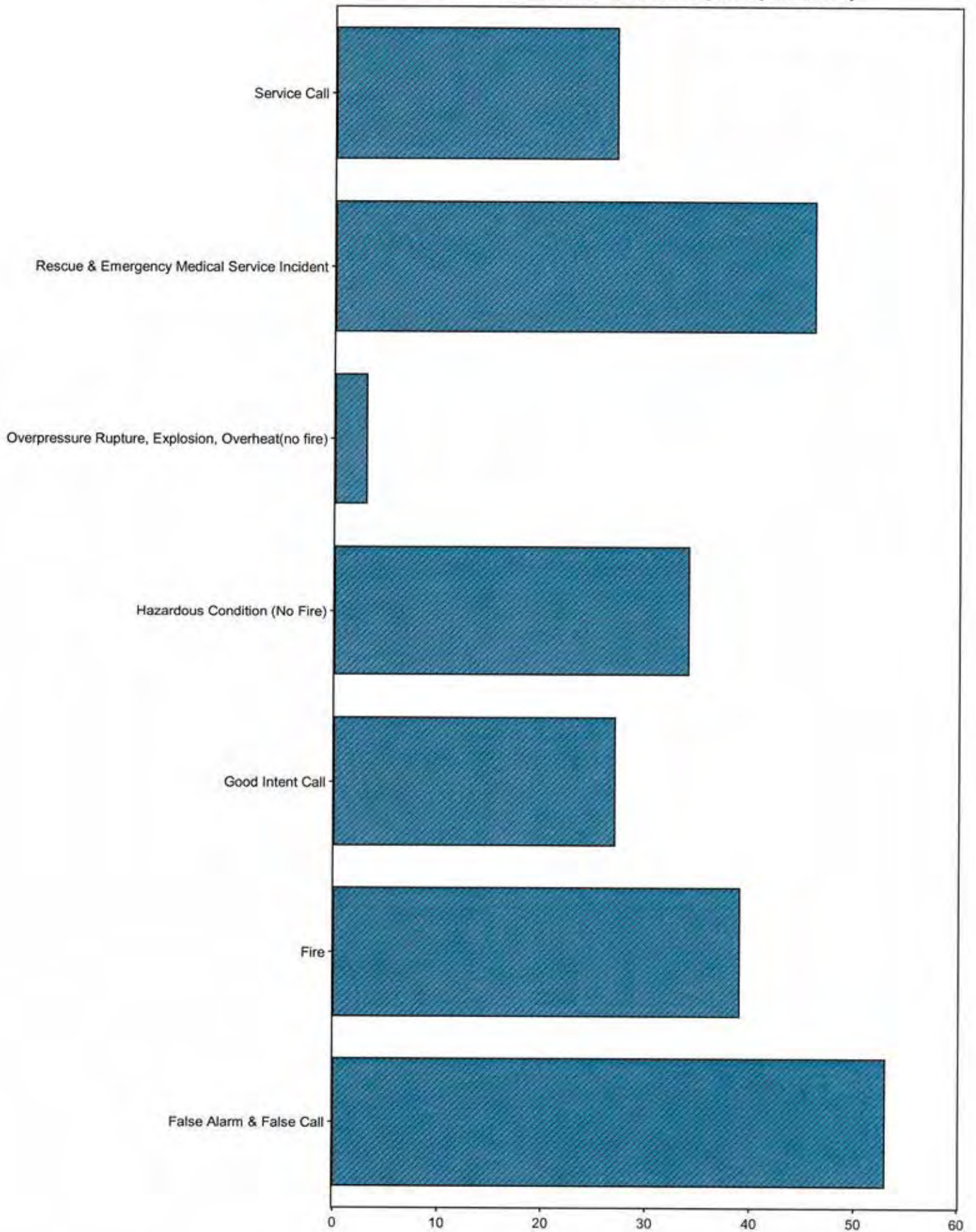

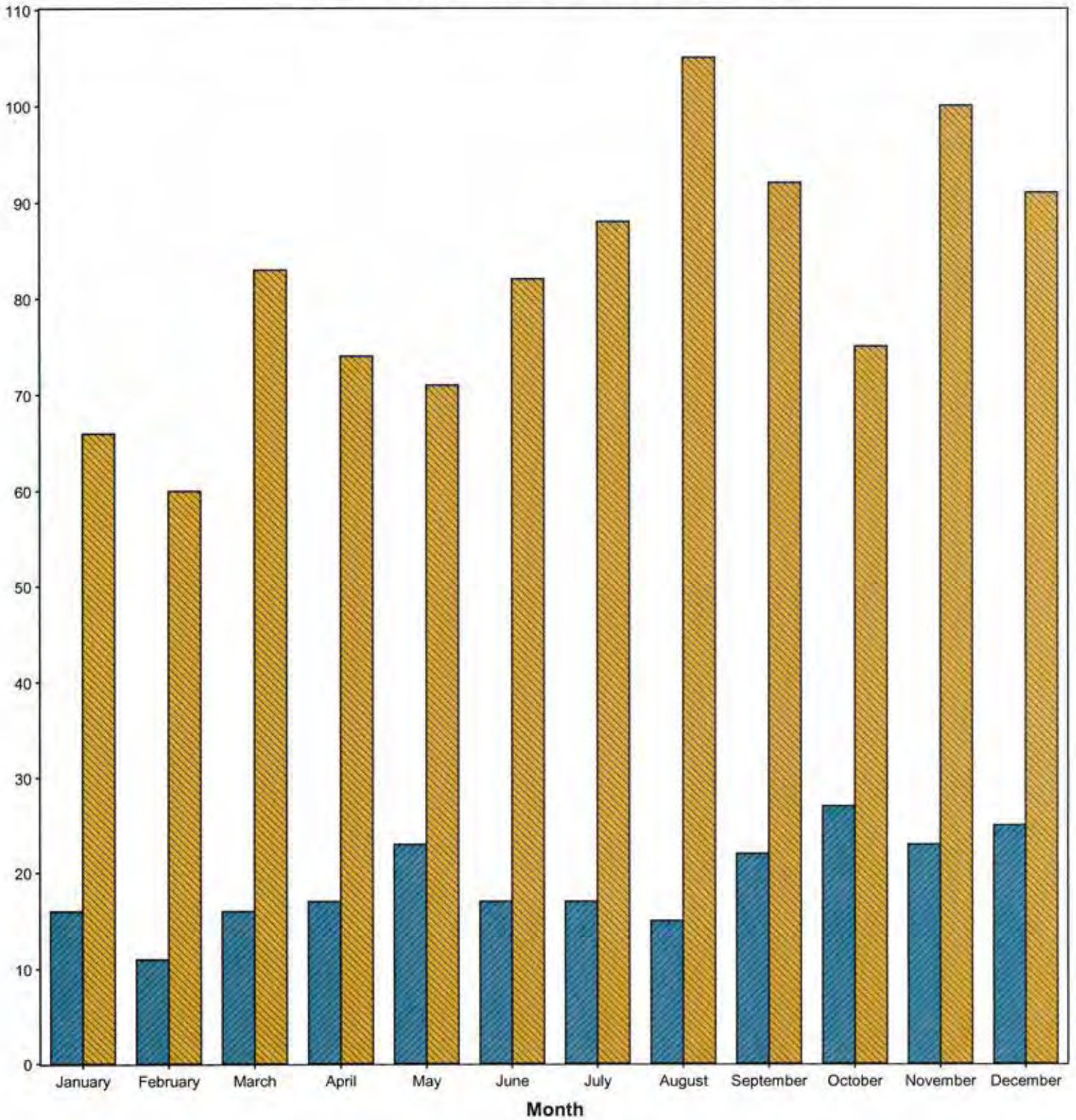

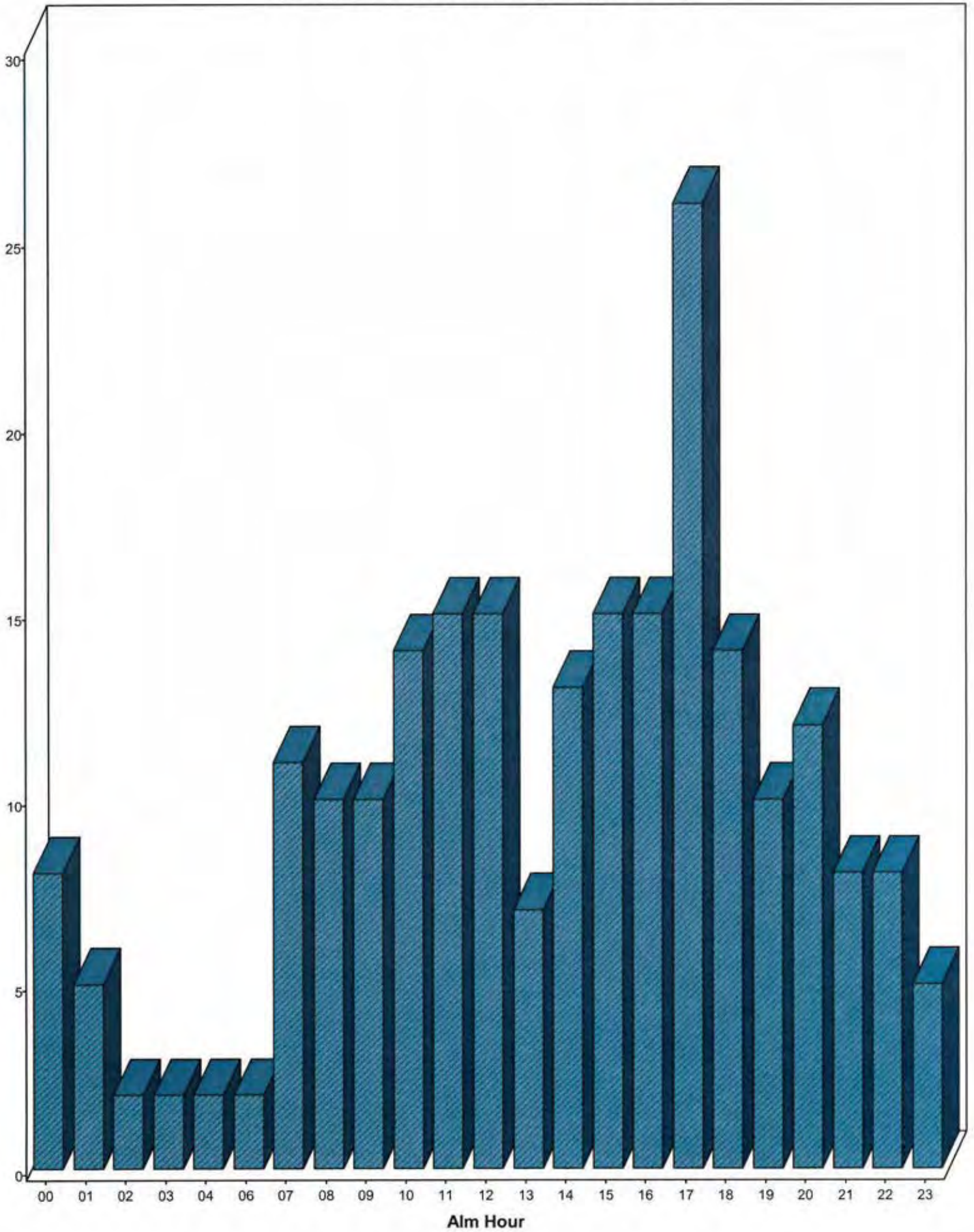

Fire Inspection and Code Enforcement

The Fire Inspection Division of the Hales Corners Fire Department is a vital part of Life/Safety, Fire/Safety, and Fire/Prevention. Our number one goal is make sure our community is safe. This is done by all our staff following our mission statement on every incident we respond to, and all our public relation actives throughout the community. All fire inspections are conducted two times in a calendar year. Some of the common fire code violations that are noticed are.

- ❖ Obstruction in exit passageways
- ❖ Illumination of exit sign
- ❖ Extinguisher maintenance
- ❖ Fire alarm system annual testing
- ❖ Sprinkler system annual testing
- ❖ Smoke detectors maintained
- ❖ Fire doors not closed
- ❖ Extension cords being used
- ❖ Missing electrical cover
- ❖ Electrical clearance

In 2016, the Inspection Division observed 551 fire code violations. This is an annual decrease from 2015, with 44% less violations. With the violations being observed and brought to the attention of the occupant of the business, all the violations were corrected. This is due to the numerous re-inspections confirming corrections. As you can see the Fire Inspection Division has a responsibility to help improve the quality of life safety through better fire prevention in the Village of Hales Corners. In doing routine fire inspections and re-inspections we are able to identify unsafe conditions and deficiencies in buildings we inspect. With tools like our local fire code, State of Wisconsin Department Safety and Professional Services (DSPS) Codes, National Fire Protection Association (NFPA) Codes, and the International Building and Fire Code (IBC & IFC), we strive to provide a reliable means to reduce the loss of life and property in the Village of Hales Corners. Working together with businesses and multi-family buildings helps reduce violations, and have a safer environment for all.

Community Outreach Public Education

Under the leadership of the fire department, every day of the year in the Village of Hales Corners, Hales Corners Fire Department takes the message of the fire prevention program, fall prevention program, cardiopulmonary resuscitation certification (CPR) and emergency medical program out to the community with various programs designed to educate all age groups.

Traditionally public education is viewed as the fire department visiting schools in October to teach the kids STOP-DROP-ROLL. While this is true, the Hales Corners Fire Department has defined public education programs to focus on various age groups.

October is our busiest time of year. In 2015, members of the fire department brought the message to over 2,972 children and 956 adults. Our fire prevention is a tiered approach, which builds on the previous year's material presented at each grade level. This ensures that the children get to see something new every year while reinforcing what they have learned in the previous years. Our programs touch on:

- ✓ Seeing a firefighter dressed in his protective gear
- ✓ STOP-DROP-ROLL
- ✓ Crawling low in simulated smoke
- ✓ Having an escape plan
- ✓ Having a meeting place
- ✓ Checking smoke detectors
- ✓ Checking the home for fire hazards
- ✓ Survive Alive house for hands on practice
- ✓ Collaborate with Forest Ridge Apartments to provide our fire prevention program, fall prevention program, and emergency medical program.

In 2016 the fire prevention and public education program performed different public education events with over 300 staff hours dedicated to this area. These events include: the presentation of our material at several outdoor events such as: Fourth of July events, National Night Out, Whitnall Homecoming Parade, Delivering Santa Claus in addition to fire station tours and birthday parties, to name a few. The Public Education events outside of the fire prevention program at the schools reach over a thousand children and adults throughout the year. We strive to expand our interactive public programs in an effort to educate children and adults and to answer any questions they may have, while maintaining fiscal responsibility and working within budget.



As the Mission Statement for the Hales Corners Fire Department reads, 'it is through our members that we provide effective fire prevention'.

Training and Education – 2016

The Training Division manages the professional development, readiness level, and continuing education for the Operations of the Fire Department. We strive to assure that all personnel are prepared to respond for any call for assistance from the citizens of the Village of Hales Corners, those working within its borders, or anyone traveling through our great Village. The Department takes pride in training its personnel to the highest standards in the fire service. The training division strives for excellence in every aspect of what we do, to make sure our Firefighters are ready to answer any call they are dispatched to. This year the training division continued to use its many resources within and outside the department to enhance training and educational needs. The following are the highlights of over 3,000 training hours completed in 2016. The annual training hours over the last several years has seen a decrease. This decrease is due to several reasons including requiring basic EMT and firefighter certifications prior to being eligible for hire. Many of the firefighters applying to the department have numerous certifications and classes which previous personnel were required to attend. The focus is now more on continuing education, skill development, and proficiency.

Firefighting Trainings

- Live fire training
- Various scenario-based Incident Command and Company Officer development training sessions.
- Department-wide fire apparatus driver operator and ladder training
- Active shooter drills
- High Rise training shared services

Emergency Medical Services

- Monthly training in basic life support skills and mandatory continuing education. This training keeps us current on all levels of Emergency Medical Technician (EMT) certifications within the Fire Department: EMT-Basic, and EMT Advanced. Currently paramedics receive training on their own.



EVERYONE GOES HOME

Recognizing the need to do more to prevent line-of-duty deaths in addition, injuries, the National Fallen Firefighters Foundation has launched a national initiative to bring prevention to the forefront.
